

Services for Mr. Larry Glenn DuVall, 81, who entered into rest December 2, 2024, will be conducted Wednesday, December 11, 2024, at 11 o'clock at Fort Jackson National Cemetery. Military Honors will be rendered at the graveside.

Mr. DuVall was a native of Marmet, West Virginia and the son of Mr. Glenn Willis and Frances Scott DuVall. Having settled in Belvedere, SC, Larry served in the United States Air Force from 1963 to 1967 until he was honorably discharged. Larry was a jack of all trades but was most notably known as a salesman for medical supplies.

Looking One's Loveliest in 1931

A Pictorial Summary of Model 'A' Fashions

When historians refer to the 1930's, we read about 'the great depression". Songwriters were asking, "Brother can you spare a dime?" But fashion dictators

were trending feminine hairstyles, wider shoulders, narrow hips and evening wear with a new emphasis on the back. In 1931,

dresses were charming, graceful, slenderizing and exuded femininity.

The dropped waist was gone. The waistline was worn higher at the natural line and belts were worn tighter. Hemlines were one to two inches longer than the previous year falling at the mid-calf and for the most part were straight although uneven hems were seen on "Sunday Supper", semi-formal and other formal afternoon fashions.

Sleeveless dresses had matching jackets or boleros. Dresses with short sleeves were here to stay. Semi-formal dresses had capped sleeves, short elbow length sleeves or a shallow cape attached.

Dresses were seen in black, shades of dark brown, wine, maroon, rose and a variety of dark greens. Black or navy blue were combined with white, pastels or bright colors and were important spring and summer colors. Shades of tan and brown were mixed with colors in a print or as an accent. Ornamental bows and flowers of earlier years weren't as common but were seen on semi-formal and formal dresses


Felt and straw cloches had close fitting brims with shallow cap-like crowns for daytime wear. For afternoon wear, straw and horse hair hats tended to have larger brims. In general, hats were worn up off the face, pulled down on one side to expose a woman's graceful waves of hair. Her hat was matched with her accessories instead of her dress or coat as in previous years. Fur scarves were still popular and a sign of discriminating taste. Shawls and scarves were practical and available during all years. Colored stone jewelry was almost entirely relegated to sport and morning outings. Pearls are seen more with fluttering afternoon frocks and colored crystals

were popular for afternoons and evenings.

Purses were still a major accessory, usually made from leather, but fabric purses were also found with needlework or petit point. Late afternoon and evening bags were smaller than daytime bags. Course mesh, fine mesh and enameled mesh were popular with art deco



designs and shapes. Glass beaded purses with colorful designs were popular for evening outings.



The new lines were nothing if they weren't slenderizing. Women were encouraged to select dresses with small prints, soft flattering collars and surplice closings. The sophisticated, elegant look and fashions of 1931 were meant to uplift women and help them forget the bleak years and the shapeless day wear when the stock market crashed.

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
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THE SHADE TREE A'S - THIRTY YEARS AGO



The 1985-2005 Shade Tree A's *Newsletters* are now available on the Shade Tree A's website. They can be accessed via the same "button" as the other *Newsletters*, but they are password protected. The same password used to access the member roster is used to access the *Newsletters*. Thank you Dan Perla for scanning these and posting on the website.

In the January 1995 issue of the Shade Tree A's Newsletter, a full calendar of events was presented for the coming year. A handy drawing of the tools originally included with the Model A car when new was also provided. A report on the Harlem Christmas Parade stated that the parade had been cancelled due to rain, but not before nineteen Model A's from the Shade Tree A's had met at the parade assembly location. Nonetheless, the hardy Shade Tree A'ers decided to make their own parade. Led by Don Turley in his 1931 Deluxe Roadster, the "private parade" toured through business and residential areas of Harlem. Reports on other parades were provided including reports on the Hephzibah Christmas Parade, the Georgia Regional Hospital Christmas Parade and the Thomson Christmas Parade. Rain hampered many of the parades and Craig McMullin took a lot of heat for not bringing his 1930 Fordor out in bad weather, so he devised a new way to keep it dry. He just surrounds it with club umbrella carriers. Iim McPherson's Authenticity and Troubleshooting column discussed license plates.

TECHNICAL TOPICS

Jim's Tech Tips


"Difficult Steering"

Many Model A owners find their car hard to steer when parking or maneuvering at low speed. After you confirm that there is oil in the steering gear box (not grease), the tires are all inflated to 35 psi, and everything on the front axle has been properly greased, you are left with the most likely cause: The spindle bolt (kingpin) "thrust bearings" are defective or they are not shimmed up properly to support the weight of the car. You can confirm this by using a floor jack to take some weight off of the front wheels, and then see if the steering effort is drastically reduced. If it is, the problem is the bearings.

To correct this, you need to remove everything from the spindles to get to the kingpins and remove them. See Les Andrews' Red Book, starting on page 1-209, for directions. The illustration below comes from later in that section.

Clean the thrust bearing and replace it if it does not turn smoothly or shows any signs of wear. Pack the bearing with grease before reinstalling.

When reassembling, you need to test fit the spindle with the kingpin fully locked in place with the locking pin. Temporarily leave the large felt seal and metal washer off of the bottom of the spindle for this. Start with the number of shims previously used, then add 1 shim at a time until very little or no vertical movement of the spindle is felt on the kingpin. It can take up to 4 shims to compensate for wear.



At some point, adding a shim may jam up the spindle, making it hard to turn on the kingpin. If it does, take that last shim out, reassemble, and confirm that the spindle again moves easily, as it should. Now reassemble the spindle on the axle with the felt seal and the cupped metal washer installed between the axle and the bottom part of the spindle (the metal cup touches the axle, the felt touches the spindle). The added thickness of the felt seal may temporarily make the spindle a bit stiff turning on the kingpin, but it will quickly flatten out and move smoothly when you drive.

Now reinstall everything that attaches to the spindle, install the brakes, maybe use this as an opportunity to clean and repack the wheel bearings, then install the drums and the wheels. Grease all of the fittings well. Go for a test drive, enjoy the easier steering, and Have a Model A Day!
